# "Living Trees Project"



Dr Lyn Dowds and her husband Jonny have been working in Malawi for the past number of years supported by Presbyterian Church in Ireland Overseas Mission department. (When home they have visited our Threads group who send out blankets, baby clothes etc for the hospital where Lyn works). They both have seen a real need that urgently needs addressed. They write "With the assistance of the schools, through the teachers, parents and orchard committee, we are starting a school feeding program. One of the aims of the project is to improve the nutrition of school children - with fruit trees being grown in school grounds to provide additional nutritious food for the children and in cases where there is excess fruit – it can then be sold locally to buy much needed resources for the school'. We are building tree nurseries at 21 local schools (20 primary and 1 secondary) with some already finished" Our congregation's Malawi Fund has accumulated funds to be spent on a project like this. A sum of £5,500 has been sent through PCI, to build some of these nurseries. Dr Dowds will keep us informed of the Project's progress.
